



- Board composed of clinical and subject matter experts as well as autistic self-advocates










WHY AUTISM - BY THE NUMBERS

Requirements:

- At least 80% of guest-facing staff is trained and certified via IBCCES
- Onsite review by IBCCES experts
 - Report with recommendations to implement over time
 - Sensory guides
- Committed to ongoing training/supports
 - Renewal every 2 years with updated learning is part of the program
 - Ongoing support from IBCCES for lifetime of credential

Why is Toledo becoming a Certified Autism Destination?

- Pursuing certification was the right thing for Toledo to do from both a human and business perspective.

- It gives Toledo another reason to stand out as a destination that people will want to return to.




Becoming a CERTIFIED AUTISM DESTINATION (CAD)

- Certification requires a representative number of stakeholders from key areas to become certified as organizations (Certified Autism Center), which is achieved by training and certifying their staff.
 - Some attractions will also undergo an onsite review wherein IBCCES visits and reviews the full guest experience to provide specific recommendations and options for accessibility, as well as create sensory guides for each ride/attraction/exhibit.

>> The goal is to provide multiple options for visitors to *stay* and *play* where they feel safe, welcomed, and can make lasting memories.

The International Board of Credentialing and Continuing Education Standards (IBCCES) has named The Toledo Museum of Art (TMA) a Certified Autism Center™ (CAC). The CAC designation is granted to organizations that have completed training and certification to better serve autistic and sensory sensitive visitors. The training program covers various topics, including sensory awareness, environment, communication, motor and social skills, program development and emotional awareness. TMA is the first museum in the Toledo area to earn the designation. IBCCES also conducted an onsite review to provide additional ways the Museum can accommodate visitors and create detailed sensory guides for each exhibition as part of the certification process.


